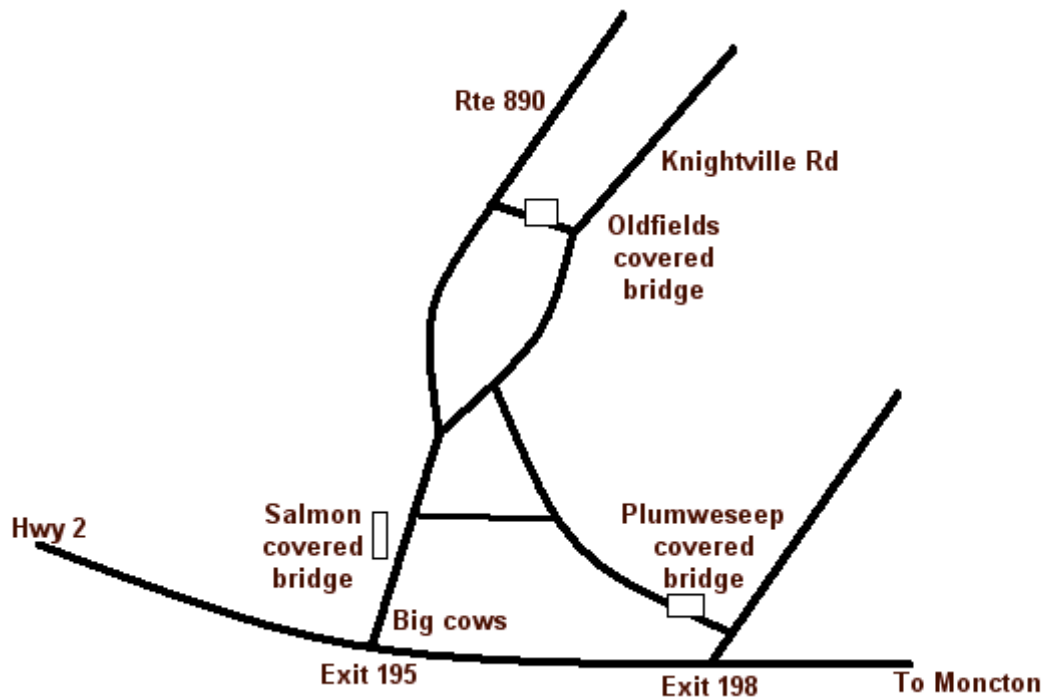


## See 3 of Kings County's most popular covered bridges!



Enjoy up to three of our most popular covered bridges on an easy, flexible tour, whether you have 10 minutes or an afternoon!

**If you have time for one bridge**, take Trans Canada Highway exit 195 (Four Corners). Put the big cows on your right and follow Rte. 890 one kilometre until you see the Salmon covered bridge park on your left. This bridge is no longer in use. It does provide a great chance to examine a bridge and its construction.

**If you have half an hour**, continue on Rte. 890 to the Plumweseep Cross Road on your right, immediately following the Salmon covered bridge. Follow the crossroad to the end, and turn right and follow road across railroad tracks to the Plumweseep covered bridge. You can drive through the bridge to Rte. 114, where you can turn right and meet Trans Canada Highway exit 198.

**Take in all three covered bridges** by starting at TCH exit 195, stopping at the Salmon covered bridge 1 km on your left. Continue on Rte. 890 towards Newtown and Cornhill for 13 km, watching carefully for the **gravel** Oldfields cross road on your right. Enjoy a visit at the Oldfields covered bridge, New Brunswick's second most famous timbered treasure! Travel through the bridge to the Knightville Road. Turn right, and watch for the Plumweseep Road approximately 7 km on your left. Continue straight on road for five minutes until you see the Plumweseep covered bridge. You can drive through the bridge to Rte. 114, where you can turn right and meet Trans Canada Highway exit 198.

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
